## Aluette



## Background

The game Aluette (or La Vache, which means a cow in French) first appears in France in the $16^{\text {th }}$ century where it was documented by Francois Rabelais. The game may be older, as it uses a Spanish deck of cards, older than the French deck of cards developed in the $15^{\text {th }}$ century.

It is a trick taking game that uses a Spanish deck of 48 cards. This is a standard 52 card deck with all the 10 s removed. It is generally played by 4 players paired at partners, but can be played by 2 players.

## Dealing

The dealer is selected by whatever means desired. The dealer deals nine cards to each player beginning with the player to the dealer's left and continuing in a clockwise motion.

## Trump and Following Suit

There is no trump suit and the players are not required to follow suit.

## playing the trick

The player to the left of the dealer leads the first card and thereafter, the winner of the trick leads the next. The other players each play a card following the order of the deal. The highest card played takes the trick. If the trick is a tie, the cards are set aside and the winner of the next trick wins all the cards. If a tie occurs on the last hand, then the winner of the first hand wins the trick.

## Card Ranking

The ranking of the cards during play is somewhat unusual. The cards are divided into four categories which are ranked highest to lowest below:

* Luettes -
$>3$ of Clubs
$>3$ of Hearts
$>2$ of Clubs
$>2$ of Hearts
* Doubles
$>9$ of Hearts
$>9$ of Clubs
$>2$ of Diamonds
$>2$ of Spades
- Figures
$>$ All Kings regardless of suit
> All Queens regardless of suit
$>$ All Jacks regardless of suit
* Bigailles
$>$ All the remaining cards in the following order, $9 s-8 s-7 s-6 s-5 s-4 s-3 s-2 s$


## Scoring

The first player or team to win 12 hands wins the game. After all nine cards are played, the winner id determined as follows:

* The player or team with the most tricks
* A player who has the Three of Diamonds wins the hand, even if they do not have the most tricks
* A player who has the Jack of Spades loses the hand, even if they have the most tricks
